This means that this type of RN has earned a graduate-level degree such as a Master's of Science in Nursing (MSN) or a Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP), and has been specially trained in one of the four recognized APRN roles.

Indiana's advanced practice nurses are licensed as RNs. They must meet state standards in order to practice. However, they may carry out some advanced practice duties under the authority of just their RN license. An additional state-issued credential is required in some, but not all, cases.

With over 267,000 advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) in the U.S, APRNs represent a powerful force in the health care system. The Consensus Model provides guidance for states to adopt uniformity in the regulation of APRN roles. The target date to complete that work is 2015.

A nurse with a valid RN license issued by Alabama or another NLC party state and an advanced practice specialty certification may apply for Board approval to engage in Advanced Practice Nursing (APN). APN includes the following four categories: Certified Registered Nurse Practitioner (CRNP), Certified Nurse Midwife (CNM), Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA), and Clinical Nurse Specialist (CNS).
