John Eliot, (born 1604, Widford, Hertfordshire, England—died May 21, 1690, Roxbury, Massachusetts Bay Colony [now in Massachusetts, U.S.]), Puritan missionary to the Native Americans of Massachusetts Bay Colony whose translation of the Bible in the Algonquian language was the first Bible printed in North America.. Educated in England, Eliot graduated from Jesus College, Cambridge, in 1622 ...

John Eliot (c. 1604 —21 May 1690) was a Puritan missionary to the American Indians who some called "the apostle to the Indians" and the founder of Roxbury Latin School in the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1645.

John Eliot was baptized in England as an infant on AUGUST 5, 1604. He sailed to America and preached his first sermon in the Algonquian language in 1646. Eliot printed the first book in North America - the Bay Psalm Book. Eliot translated the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, and the Bible - the first to be printed in America, in 1663.

In 1651, Puritan missionary John Eliot established Natick as the first "praying town" on a bend in the Charles River (now South Natick). Today, scholars debate the meaning of the word "Natick," which has been said to mean: "place of searching," "place of many hills," "my home," and "my land."

Praying towns were developed by the Puritans of New England from 1646 to 1675 in an effort to convert the local Native American tribes to Christianity. Praying Indians On October 28, 1646, in Nonantum (now Newton), missionary John Eliot preached his first sermon to members of the Massachusett tribe in their own language. He eventually translated the Bible into the Massachusett language and had it printed, the first Bible published in America.

In 1651, a group of Christianized Indians had founded a "Praying Town" in what is now South Natick. Led by the missionary John Eliot, the Indians built an English-style village. For 25 years the town prospered. Then, with the outbreak of King Philip's War, the colonial authorities imprisoned all Christianized Indians on an island in Boston Harbor.
