The Zohar (Hebrew זוהר; Splendor, radiance) is widely considered the most important work of Kabbalah, Jewish mysticism. It is a mystical commentary on the Torah (five books of Moses), written in medieval Aramaic and medieval Hebrew. It contains a mystical discussion of the nature of God, the origin and structure of the universe, the nature of souls, sin, redemption, good and evil, and related topics.

The Zohar, The Book of Splendor, is the foremost book of kabbalah. The book was compiled around 1280 by Moses de Leon, who claimed that was the mystical writings of Talmudic sage Rabbi Shimeon Bar Yochai (c. 70 C.E), student of the famous Rabbi Akiva.
